

Long Cut Purchased!

The Long Cut Preserve has been purchased! The Calusa Land Trust and the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation have jointly purchased this pristine mangrove forest west of St. James City.

The Long Cut Preserve is named after the waterway that cuts through its center. The preserve is a beautiful 130-acre of mangrove fringe and islands, with limited uplands along the eastern edge. As shown on the photograph, it lies north of York and Coconut Islands (which we jointly purchased with SCCF in 1998), east of Pine Island Sound, west of Cherry Estates Canal, and south of "Jungle Cut," the Galt Island Calusa mounds, and the DEP Buffer Preserve. It constitutes a perfect getaway for those who love nature. It also means that we have drawn a protective "U" of environmental preserves around the southern end of Pine Island, assuring that the essential character of St. James City, as a small town surrounded by lush subtropical habitat, will never change. We are all proud of this achievement!

Land Acquisition Committee

We closed the Long Cut Preserve purchase on September 8 and cannot wait for the celebration on November 4 at the Waterfront Restaurant! (See below for details on the party.)

More good news is that we have a contract to purchase the southern portion of Merwin Key from the current owner, the Children's Home Society of Florida. Merwin Key is the large island off the southeast coast of St. James City, just across the Intracoastal Waterway from Picnic Island. The northern portion (some 40 acres) is already preserved as part of the Matlacha Pass Wildlife Refuge, which is managed as a part of the "Ding" Darling Wildlife Refuge complex. We hope to go to closing before the November 4th Long Cut celebration and will announce the details then.

The Trust is also in the early but promising stages of negotiations with a landowner who owns four different large parcels of mangroves in St. James City and Bokeelia. As our regular readers well know, 32% of Pine Island's mangroves are still privately owned (10% have been destroyed and 58% have been preserved). We also have had discussions with several other mangrove landowners, but with less promising results.

We have three conservation easements for mangroves areas in process, one of which we hope to finalize (and announce) in the next month.

We would like to ask members to assist the Land Acquisition Committee by identifying landowners on Pine Island who are willing to donate or sell (bargain sales or full market value), in fee simple or by conservation easement, their mangrove holdings on Pine Island. The Trust is an IRS 501(c)(3) organization and all land, property, or cash donations to the Trust are fully tax deductible. In addition to income tax deductions, donors also receive relief from real property and estate taxes, but most of all get to help preserve our Pine Island environment and way of life. (We can sometimes pay up to market value for mangrove or other environmentally sensitive properties.) Call Phil Buchanan at 283-4067 for more information.

The biggest news this month is the extent of our joint projects with the Lee County Conservation 2020 program. The Board of Directors has allocated a total of \$90,000 to support 2020 program purchases and has offered to co-manage environmentally sensitive properties on Pine Island. The properties, all primarily native slash pine/palmetto uplands, are as follows:

Shiffman (proposed “Pine Island Center Preserve,” across from Winn-Dixie)	\$25,000
Thompkins (across from and north of Tropical Homesites)	\$10,000
Mills (Galt Lake Area, St. James City)	\$10,000
Todd/Hoke (north of Mills property)	\$10,000
Eckerty (Indian Lake area, north of Todd/Hoke property)	\$10,000
Eckerty (“Village Links”, south of Pine Island Village)	\$10,000
Willow Lake, Spignese portion (south of Alcorn Rd in Bokeelia)	\$10,000
Willow Lake, Mozingo portion (west of Spignese)	\$5,000

The Spignese and Mozingo properties are our latest 2020 nominations. They cover the large uplands properties with the “Pine Island Trust II” sign south of the Catholic Church in Bokeelia. The area, some 110 acres in all, is called Willow Lake because it is home to a beautiful marsh with a heavy oak canopy. The area also has very large and numerous slash pines and longleaf pines, but strangely, very few willow trees (that we have found thus far).

Calusa Canal, Phase II

Phase II of the Calusa Canal acquisition is now complete. Contributions from many sources made it possible: James and Suzanne Long and the Lee Trust for Historic Preservation, Inc. each contributed \$1,000 for the cause. Forty-five generous Calusa Land Trust members and friends and a final \$7,000 anonymous contribution put the fund drive over the top. The deed transfer took place on July 13, 2000. The CLT stewardship committee has been active in eliminating exotic vegetation, which appears to be a continual task, at least for a few years.

The CLT board of directors has voted to try to acquire all six parcels along Meadow Lane that still have evidence of the famous Calusa Canal that stretched from the Pineland archaeological site, across Pine Island, and ended at Indian Field Island in Matlacha Pass. Attempts to find willing sellers of the remaining lots have been unsuccessful to date. We have a new arrangement for the purchase of additional lots as they may become available. A national organization, the Archaeological Conservancy, has agreed to purchase any of the future acquisitions and hold them until the CLT can raise the money for their purchase. This will result in the sellers acquiring their money as soon as market value is determined and contacts can be arranged. CLT members will be informed as soon as future acquisitions can be arranged. Land Stewardship Report

Our volunteers have been busy all summer. On October 7th we worked at the St. Jude Trail weeding and trimming, then on October 14 and 15 we had local Boy Scouts working to improve Fritts Park. This is a public service project headed up by scout Jeremy Depew. This has come at a good time for the Calusa Land Trust as we are improving Fritts Park for the new season of “Music On Pine Island” starting in February 2001.

Our fall canoe and kayak trips will be on Saturday November 18 to Calusa Island Preserve and on Saturday December 16 to Long Cut Preserve. Call me for details (beep me at 277-6807, enter your phone number, and I will call you back).

In September we worked at the St. James Creek eagle preserve with Lee County staffers. This was very well attended, with 17 volunteers working on trail building and maintenance. We also had three of our new Junior Rangers come out and help. They all worked hard and did an outstanding job — we are very lucky to have these young volunteers! The Junior Ranger education program was started by CLT board member Cathy Valenti last year. We now have 10 Junior Rangers and would like to have many more. This program is for 3rd graders and up. It teaches kids about their natural surroundings, how to identify plants and animals, and why it is important to protect the environment. We have self-guided workbooks available at the library or on request. It seems when kids know about this program, they really enjoy learning about their environment.

On September 11 we had a Ranger Council Meeting at Blue Crab Key. We set a work schedule for the next few months as shown below; we are always looking for new volunteers to come out and help — please consider donating some time!
